This Lent, we welcome you to the journey. As we enter our sanctuary for the worship services of Lent – from Ash Wednesday through six Sundays and Maundy Thursday – we will be stepping into the **Wilderness** to be led by the Spirit of God, gentle and restless. Through liturgy, prayers, sermon, scripture, and song we will find ourselves shaped and formed for Easter morning and all that lies beyond.

AS you prepare your heart for worship this morning, consider: What seeds planted in your wilderness have grown into a garden? What are the seeds you are planting even now that you pray will one day bloom?

After James Manley completed his first draft, he felt the "prodding and pushing" of the Holy Spirit as both a "comforter and challenger." We use this refrain to begin our worship this year. How, and where, is the Spirit "prodding and pushing" you?



In a plea for forgiveness (Kyrie Eleison), Norwegian composer, Ola Gjeilo's "The Spheres" weaves together ethereal harmonies, evoking a sense of wonder and celestial beauty.

During the Prelude on the six Sundays of Lent, meditate on the "Lenten Poem" and how you may more faithfully engage the world in your Easter life to come.

Few Welsh hymns are as wellknown or loved as this 18th century text that did not gain its popular tune until the early 20th century. In both its original text and in English translation, it is a stirring hymn of pilgrimage filled with vivid imagery from Hebrew Scripture.

In the presence of the Holy God, we become aware of the ways we fall short of God's best hopes for us, and the ways we have hurt others. We turn to God in prayer, asking for forgiveness.

We sing of the mysterious Grace of God, of forgiveness and new life. During the Lenten season we remain seated, aware that the only adequate response to this "wondrous love" is to "sing on."

We express gratitude that through God's grace and Christ's giving of himself on the cross, we are forgiven and restored to God and one another.

"The Holy Heart" is a sacred song that invites listeners on a journey into the heart of Christ's mercy and grace. This arrangement skillfully transitions from whispered silence to soaring crescendos of praise, beautifully capturing the essence of devotion and spirituality.

In the Presbyterian Church, a sermon based on the Scripture(s) read in worship, proclaims the good news of the risen Lord, equips us to follow him more faithfully, and inspires us to proclaim the gospel to others through our own words and deeds.

Unlike many hymns on the theme of healing, this text includes the ministry of medical personnel as instruments of God's healing activity. It also acknowledges that illness includes mental, emotional, and spiritual, not just physical.

THE IONA COMMUNITY

The Iona Community is an ecumenical Christian community that is committed to seeking new ways of living the Gospel in today's world. It was founded in 1938, the community now has over 250 members, women and men, lay and ordained, from many backgrounds and different church traditions. At the three residential centers —on Iona and on the Ross of Mull — guests are welcomed from March through October and over Christmas.

Do you remember the first time you heard the Lord's Prayer? Most of us can't only not remember when we first heard this prayer, we can't remember when we memorized it, because memorizing wasn't a conscious effort. Lernt is an appropriate time to consider the prayer Jeus taught us to pray in a careful way. As you pray this season, try "embodying" the prayer by following the liturgist in the front of the sanctuary. In any case, don't just "recite" the prayer this Lent, think about the words so you may experience it anew.

The offertory is an original Swedish hymn entitled "O Store Gud" written in 1885 by Carl Boberg. In a nationwide poll done by Christianity Today, the hymn was the second most popular hymn after "Amazing Grace."
